### Digital Technologies in Primary Care Special Interest Group Networking event

Mon 7<sup>th</sup> October 2019, The Stanley Building, London

#### Welcome

After initially welcoming guests Dr Helen Atherton explained more about the Special Interest Group (SIG), how delegates can become members of the Digital Technologies in Primary Care network and the importance of research in academic primary care.

#### Networking Bingo

Delegates participated in a 'networking bingo' session, involving talking to as many other people in the room as possible. The aim was to find people that represent as many of the bingo squares as possible. This included things like 'someone who is a GP', 'someone that you could potentially collaborate with', and 'someone with an unusual hobby'.

The session saw delegates enjoying many brief but interesting conversations, in something that resembled an academic speed dating session! Many email addresses were exchanged, and some exciting collaborations have been discussed.

#### Perspectives on research

To get a visual indicator on delegates' perceptions of academic research, they were asked to stand on in a line depending on how strongly they agreed or disagreed with the statement that "academic research is too slow". While standing on the line, delegates were then asked to exchange their opinions on academic research. Overall, delegates found that academic research was indeed very slow amongst others due to the lengths of peer reviewing and grant applications. This interactive session was repeated after a presentation by Dr Helen Atherton on "Research on Academic Primary Care" in which she explained how academic research is conducted, why academic research is important and what the challenges of academic research are. Repeating the interactive session allowed delegates to reflect on whether their opinion on academic research had shifted. Delegates also brainstormed on the values of academic research and stated that the robustness, transparency and independence of academic of research were highly valuable.

#### Keynote presentation

Dr Rebecca Rosen from the Nuffield Trust presented this year's keynote at the networking event.

Rebecca gave an interesting insight in to policy analysis and policy process within digital health. As well as how Nuffield Trusts organisation can differ in its approach to research compared to other forms such as academic research, which sparked a good debate during question time afterwards around the importance of different organisations that focus on academic digital technologies research in primary care.



## Dr Minal Bakhai

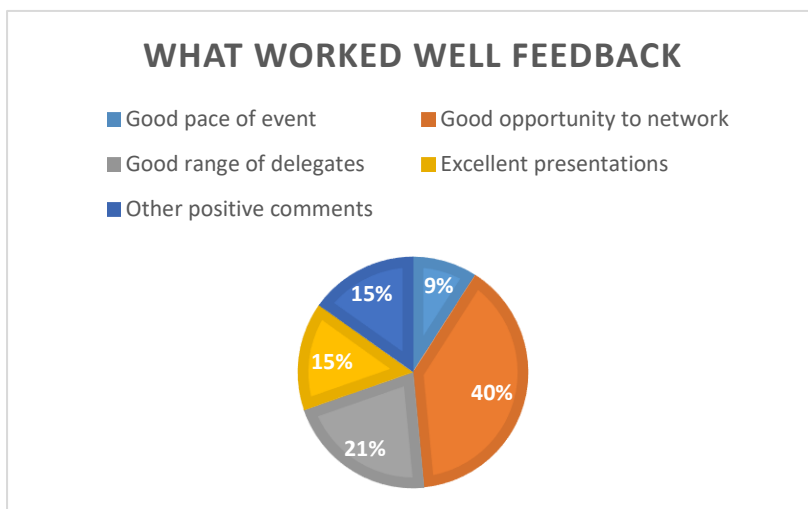

## Evaluation

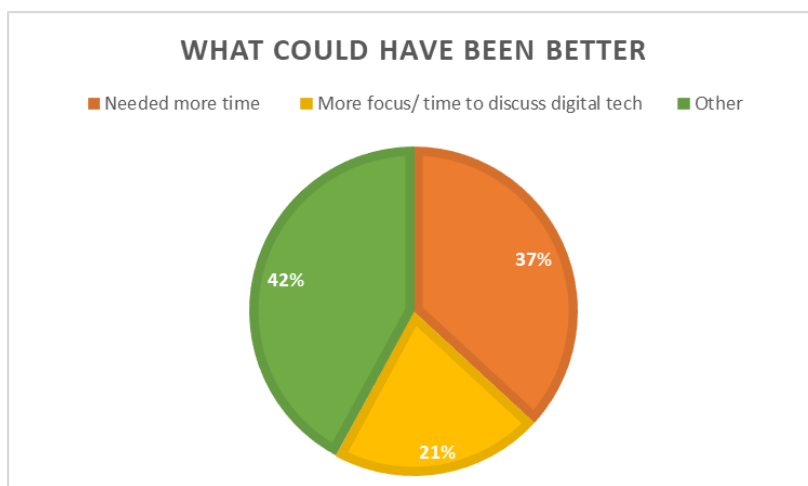
