Areas of Interest

I would like to develop and support representation from ethnic minority groups across all levels of primary care research within the UK. Ethnic minority representation needs strengthening in primary care research study participants but also among primary care academics from early career academics to senior professors.

I am a highly motivated NIHR Clinical Lecturer in General Practice at Keele University and Manchester-based GP with expertise in interdisciplinary primary care research, focusing on mental health equity in underserved populations and culturally safe healthcare delivery. - A webinar/workshop series covering "My Research Journey", idea-to-publication workflows, reference management tools, AI in research, and essential statistical methods
- Continued support for networking events, the PI of the Year award, and ad-hoc support for medical and non-medical early career academics—following in Bekki's footsteps to ensure these initiatives are sustained and expanded

Through these efforts, I hope to create practical, inclusive, and measurable opportunities that enhance competence, confidence, and career satisfaction across our early career academic community.

Areas of Interest

I am particularly interested in strengthening support for early career academics through structured peer-learning, skills exchange, and targeted training in research methods, publication workflows, and biostatistics. I also bring expertise in research methodology and am committed to promoting rigorous, transparent approaches across SAPC activities. In addition, I will join the new Special Interest Group in Urgent Care (initiated by Alex Burrell, Matthew Booker, Sara McKelvie), which will be formally launched in July 2025, and look forward to contributing to its development and impact.



Dr Shoba Dawson

Personal statement

I am applying for the SAPC Executive Committee EDI Lead role because I am committed to building a more equitable and inclusive academic primary care community.

Our work and workforce must reflect the diversity of the populations we serve. Achieving this requires embedding equity, diversity, and inclusion into our structures, processes, and values. Equally important is the meaningful support and retention of our workforce, critical to maintaining sustainability but overlooked.

I have 12 years of experience in academic primary care, focusing on advancing equity and inclusion. I co-lead GPs at the Deep End Bristol, which addresses health inequities, and the Trial Forge Inclusive Research Centre, which builds the evidence base for inclusive methodologies.

I collaborate with the NIHR Inclusion Team and HRA to develop inclusion exemplars and contribute to the School for Primary Care Research EDI Strategy Development Group. My experiences of systemic barriers have shaped my belief that we must move beyond traditional EDI frameworks, which often perpetuate tokenism. Instead, we should adopt systems-based approaches rooted in anti-exclusion principles to drive structural change, transparency, and accountability to create a lasting impact. SAPC plays a vital role in this transformation, and I am eager to help lead it.

Areas of Interest

I am interested in supporting both the education and research arms of SAPC. I am especially keen to weave in equity, diversity and inclusion in all aspects of SAPC work. I also have an interest in developing inclusive research methodologies and keen to help develop this further if this is an area of interest for SAPC.



Dr Stephen Woolford

Personal statement

My name is Stephen Woolford, and I am an NIHR Academic Clinical Fellow in General Practice at City St George's, University of London (CSGUL), as well as a GP registrar in Southwest London. With the landscape of general practice undergoing rapid change, it is increasingly important to advocate for the role of academia within our specialty. Research and medical education opportunities must be embedded in GP training and early post-qualification careers to ensure a sustainable culture of academic innovation.

As Communications Lead for the Primary care Academic CollaboraTive (PACT), I have supported the development of a UK-wide research network of over 1,000 general practice clinicians, many new to research. Locally, I organise regular pan-London teaching events for academic GP trainees and coordinate monthly academic primary care meetings at CSGUL. I have also served as a GP registrar representative to the London training deanery and am contributing to the upcoming 10 Year Health Plan through a working group of early career GPs convened by NHS England.

As SAPC's Early Career Academics Lead, I hope to bring a clear and practical voice for my colleagues, shaping policy, strengthening peer networks, and making academic primary care a more visible and viable career path.

Areas of Interest

My research interests are focussed on the pragmatic analysis of real-world problems facing general practice. I am currently the Co-Chief Investigator for The Hidden Workload Study, a national-mixed methods research study exploring the full scope of general practice workload and clinician's lived experience of workload. I was recently awarded the Early Career Research award for preliminary findings from this study at the SAPC Southeast Regional Conference. I am also interested in the interface between research and policy, and the development of communities of change in general practice and primary care.
